



"BURMESE FESTIVAL" ATTRACTS LARGE TURNOUT; FEATURES BURMA EXPERT DAVID I. STEINBERG

Cetana Educational Foundation celebrated ten years of our mission to build educational opportunities for Myanmar students with a "Burmese Festival" for more than 170 members

of the Burmese community and "friends" of Cetana.

The "Festival," held in Princeton last month, featured a talk by a leading authority on Myanmar (formerly Burma) about a growing social and economic phenomenon in that country. The evening also provided a lively mix of Burmese foods, fashion, dance and the creations of its artisans. Many objects of jade,

lacquer and wood carving were sold through a "silent auction." The Burmese dinner was the work of the Philadelphia restaurant "Rangoon."

The speaker, David I. Steinberg, Distinguished Professor and Director of Asian Studies at the Georgetown University School of Foreign Service, discussed the critical role that non-political organizations, like Cetana, are playing in the development of the country, in a talk entitled, "Preparing for the Future in Myanmar: Civil Society and Humanitarian Aid."

Professor Steinberg, who has written four books on Myanmar/Burma and many articles, is one of the few people who are able to maintain a dialogue with the government, the opposition and minority groups.

Myanmar civil society, he said, comprises "those organizations that exist in the space between the family and the state and that are to some

important degree autonomous of government and that contribute to both social and economic growth and to pluralism and democracy."


Myanmar's civil society has grown considerably since the military coup of 1988, he said. In addition to 214,000 community-based organizations dealing with local concerns

offer those that the state has found it impossible to provide or ... for whatever reasons, ignored." Examples are Save the Children (U.S.), World Vision and Medecins Sans Frontieres.

Since the original military coup of 1962, Burma/Myanmar has lost about one percent of its total population [of 50 million] through emigration -- "the educated group," he noted. Another one million unskilled workers have migrated to Thailand for security and economic reasons, he said, and thousands more are in refugee camps in Thailand. In addition to the personal tragedies is the national tragedy, "for the developmental potential of the state has been significantly diminished."

"The Cetana Foundation," he said, "is providing a modest but important means to contribute to a future Burmese society in which all its diverse peoples can participate in the welfare of the whole....this is a critical contribution, and one that needs to be expanded."

Cetana Foundation provides funding and other support for Myanmar undergraduate and graduate students at universities in Asia and the United States; created the Cetana English Proficiency Center in Yangon; and maintains a Book Project and a publishing venture in tri-lingual dictionaries for children.

PAID WITH CASH RESERVES, OFTEN USED TO COMPENSATE FOR CASH FLOW FLUCTUATIONS

In recent years 85%-90% of each dollar donated was spent on programs, with less than 15% going for administrative and fund-raising expenses.

An increased flow of donations early in the current fiscal year, beginning April 1, 2004, enabled Cetana to significantly increase our financial support of Myanmar students (see story, page 5). TEN NEW CETANA STUDENTS BRING CURRENT ACTIVE TOTAL TO 22; SCHOOLS IN PHILIPPINES ADDED

Ten new students began undergraduate or graduate studies this Fall with Cetana support, bringing the total of Cetana students and alumni to 47, and total active students to 22.

For the first time, students are attending universities in the Philippines.

Three new undergraduates in the United States are **may phoybob** and **hlaing zayar min** at Berea College, Kentucky, and **april hla khaing** at Linfield College in Oregon.

- No active political affiliation;
- Commitment to return to Myanmar for a minimum of three years after completion of studies;
- Financial need.

Selection of students is performed without regard to religion, race or ethnicity.
